The Great Lakes Crisis

The Great Lakes ecosystem—and all the life it supports—is being destroyed by persistent toxic chemicals.

The IJC has recommended phasing out production and use of persistent toxins—including the class of chlorine-based poisons—to protect this unique and fragile ecosystem.
