Comments due for Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness fuel treatment plans:

Comments to the U.S. Forest Service's Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for fuel treatment in the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness are due February 20th. Excessive fuel for wildfire was created after a massive windstorm damaged over 350,000 acres of forest in July 1999 (HW#183, #191). The DEIS proposes one "no action" alternative and four action alternatives--each action alternative uses prescribed burns to lessen the threat of wildfire.

The Friends of the Boundary Waters Wilderness reports that the USFS prefers an alternative (Alternative B) that would create a patchwork of small burns throughout the wilderness located next to natural barriers-such as lakes, streams and wetlands-- to effectively reduce the potential size and spreading rate of potential wildfires in the blow down area. The Friends state that "fire is an essential ecological process in the BWCAW" and support allowing natural fire in the wilderness to the greatest extent possible and prescribed fires that mimic the ecological effects of natural fires. To this end and in response to the DEIS, the Friends support a different alternative (Alternative F), which proposes to burn contiguous units in close succession to create large openings. This action would not only reduce the threat of wildfire, but also better reflect the BWCAW's natural and historic fire patterns than the USFS's alternative choice. Additionally, in their comments to the USFS the Friends recommend adding three control burn sites to Alternative F that were originally proposed in Alternative B, to reduce the risk of wildfire escaping into Quetico Provincial Park and the Fernberg Corridor.
