adequacy of the plan and critics' points in disagreement; and list any lobbying activities the company has engaged in on a local or national level to influence public policy on evacuation plans. The directors and executive officers of UNION ELECTRIC are asked to "assume responsibility for their decision to construct the Callaway plant by including in each annual report to the shareholders current estimates of projected costs of any accident which would result in the shutdown of the Callaway plant for six months or more and the company's plans for its absorption of these costs."

—**Nuclear waste for nuclear weapons.** BOSTON EDISON, COMMONWEALTH EDISON, CONSOLIDATED EDISON.

Directors of these utilities are asked to notify the Department of Energy of their opposition to the use of spent nuclear reactor fuel for production of nuclear weapons. BOSTON EDISON and CONSOLIDATED EDISON are requested to make known their desire "not to sell, lease, lend, transfer or otherwise assign or permit the use of any of the companies' nuclear properties or spent fuel from those properties to be used to produce nuclear weapons." They are also asked to support through company lobbyists and/or political action committees, the Senate-sponsored Hart-Simpson amendment, which prohibits "transfer of plutonium from commercial reactors to the DOE for use in nuclear weapons." COMMONWEALTH EDISON is asked to also inform President Reagan of their position on the issue.

—**Nuclear power.** PACIFIC GAS & ELECTRIC.

PG&E are requested to study the costs of electricity produced by its Diablo Canyon nuclear plant taking into account the expected lifetime of the facility; government subsidies; and the cost of storing radioactive waste, decommissioning the facility when it is no longer operable and fluctuating uranium prices. The directors also are asked to compare these data to alternative forms of energy production such as fossil fuel and conservation and to issue a policy statement on the viability of future nuclear power plant construction.

Environment:

—**Corporate governance.** OCCIDENTAL PETROLEUM.

This resolution proposes that OXY's bylaws be amended to provide for sufficient time during the annual meeting of shareholders for presentation and discussion of matters properly presented by shareholders. During the 1982 annual meeting none of the sponsors of shareholder resolutions were permitted to present or speak to their resolutions. The resolutions specifically calls for the bylaws to say: "Proposals, properly presented by shareholders, will be considered individually, and with adequate deliberation."

—**Mining on Indian land.** EXXON.

EXXON has discovered a rich copper-zinc deposit next to the Sokaogon Chippewa Indian reservation in northern Wisconsin, a site which the Sokaogon Chippewa have historically claimed as part of their reservation. The Sokaogon Chippewa have refused EXXON's financial offer to lease the reservation for mineral exploration and have reasserted their claim to the larger area which includes the mineral deposit. The Sokaogon Chippewa have pledged to pursue their claim through all legal channels; EXXON has stated its intention to obtain a mining permit from the state of Wisconsin. The resolution asks the company to postpone further investment in the project or pursuit of the mining permit until the territorial claims have been settled.

—**Tobacco sales in the Third World.** PHILIP MORRIS, R.J., REYNOLDS.

PHILIP MORRIS is asked to make it corporate policy that it will not directly or indirectly promote, distribute or sell its cigarettes in any country where the government "does not have an operating vehicle for disseminating warnings to consumers about the health hazards associated with cigarette smoking" or enter any new country until such a mechanism is in place.

R.J. REYNOLDS is requested to report to shareholders on Third World regions of Asia, Africa and Latin America where the company manufactures and/or markets cigarettes, including the market size and advertising costs of tobacco sales in these regions. The report should also describe present company policy on the World Health Organization recommendation to ban tobacco promotion especially in the Third World; limiting cigarette tar and nicotine levels in the Third World to those in the U.S.; and informing consumers of the risks of tobacco use.

—**Toxic waste.** OCCIDENTAL PETROLEUM, UPJOHN.

OCCIDENTAL PETROLEUM is asked "to make available to shareholders upon request a May 21, 1981 report on potential environmental liabilities and future annual environmental reports." Of ongoing concern to sponsors are the toxic waste disposal practices of both OCCIDENTAL and its subsidiary HOOKER CHEMICAL, implicated in four toxic waste disposal sites near Niagara Falls, New York as well as a number of other chemical dump sites.

Sponsors of the UPJOHN resolution request the directors establish

company-wide policy to "enclose all waste systems at all plants and install the best available technology to prevent toxic chemicals from being released into the environment at all plants." The resolution evolved from years of protests by residents of North Haven, Connecticut concerned about odors and noxious fumes emitted from the UPJOHN's local chemical plant, protests which were supported by forty-four members of the Yale University Medical School Faculty.

IV. INTERNATIONAL HEALTH

Infant formula:

—**WHO Code compliance.** ABBOTT LABORATORIES, BRISTOL-MYERS.

These resolutions recall that in 1981, 118 countries of the World Health Assembly adopted the WHO/UNICEF International Code of Marketing for Breastmilk Substitutes, which was reaffirmed without dissent in 1982. The resolutions also note that NESTLE, "the largest infant formula manufacturer in the world," has stated its intention to comply with the code and ask these U.S. manufacturers to "endorse and implement the WHO/UNICEF Code as a minimum requirement as stated in the WHA Resolutions of 1981 and 1982."

—**Secret ballot.** BRISTOL-MYERS.

In recent years companies manufacturing infant formula have received shareholders resolutions critical of infant formula marketing practices. The sponsors of this resolution explain that "without the secret ballot, management has an unfair advantage because they know how each shareholder votes." As a remedy, the sponsors ask that company directors take appropriate action to see that stockholder meeting proxies, ballots and voting tabulations that identify stockholders be kept secret, except as by law in the State of Delaware where BRISTOL-MYERS is incorporated.

Pharmaceuticals:

—**Sale of Depo-Provera in the Third World.** UPJOHN.

UPJOHN manufactures Depo-Provera, an injectable hormonal contraceptive widely available elsewhere, but not licensed in Japan, India or the United States. In 1978 the U.S. Government refused to license the drug for use as a contraceptive because animal tests had shown a variety of side effects and potential risks. The resolution asks the company to report to shareholders a list of side effects including description of the scientific debate over each and continuing studies of efforts to improve the product; a description of efforts to have Depo-Provera licensed in the U.S.; and UPJOHN's criteria for assessing Depo-Provera's risks and benefits worldwide and its policies for obtaining the informed consent of recipients.

Drug lobbying in Bangladesh. AMERICAN HOME PRODUCTS.

Noting that "drug proliferation is a major problem in the Third World," sponsors ask AHP's directors to prepare a report which states company policy on lobbying governments of developing countries on pharmaceutical legislation; describes steps taken by the company to obtain assistance from the U.S. government in lobbying the government of Bangladesh against its recent drug-reform law including an explanation of what in the law the company supports and opposes and why; and outlines needed steps and potential risks if the company was to support efforts of developing nations to expand the use of generic drugs and essential drug lists.

—**Drug sales.** PFIZER, SMITHKLINE BECHMAN.

Directors of these companies are asked to prepare a report on the steps to be taken and the risks involved if the company were to support efforts of developing nations to establish and implement use of an essential drugs list. The PFIZER resolution asks the directors also to examine supporting expanded use of generic drugs. SMITHKLINE BECHMAN directors are asked to include in their report a description of "the mechanism that is operative to assure the therapeutical effectiveness of drugs sold in developing country markets."

V. INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE

International:

—**International lending.** CONTINENTAL ILLINOIS, REPUBLIC NEW YORK.

These resolutions request that management prepare a report on countries where the banks have exposure exceeding \$100 million, excluding countries where management assesses no serious risk. Each report would describe the loans, including the amount of nonperforming loans; assess the economic and political risks involved with them; and describe the bank's economic, social, political and human rights criteria for making loans.

—**Foreign lending.** CANADIAN IMPERIAL BANK OF COMMERCE.

The bank has been reporting some data on its foreign lending in its an-
