REPORT ON THE ISO 14,000 SURVEY OF PROVINCIAL AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AGENCIES

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1.0 INTRODUCTION

The International Organization for Standardization (ISO) was established in Geneva, Switzerland in 1947 for the purpose of developing world wide standards to facilitate the exchange of goods and services. The ISO traditionally set technical standards, such as the size of screws, but in the 1980s, began establishing standards related to quality management (ISO 9,000).

ISO 9,000 is based on the evaluation of the *system* by which a product is produced, rather than the product itself. In 1993, the ISO went further down the path of "non-technical" standard setting and began work on environmental systems (ISO 14,000).

The ISO 14,000 series is now actively being presented as a system for global environmental management and it takes the ISO into a new domain of public, rather than engineering, standard setting. The environment is a completely new field for ISO and the procedures that were adequate for technical matters are insufficient to deal with environmental issues. In addition, ISO 14,000 pushes the argument for business "self regulation" into a new phase. The concern is that the ISO 14,000 series was drafted without public debate; will likely be implemented regardless of public opinion or pre-existing international environmental conventions; only measures a firm's conformance with its own management system, not its environmental, health or safety performance; produces volumes of environmental information that is confidential and need not be given to the public, government authorities or workers; and requires compliance with only local regulation, not international or even the firm's home country standards.

2.0 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

CELA undertook a survey of provincial and federal government agencies to:

- 1) determine each agencies awareness of the ISO 14,000 initiative;
- 2) determine the views and experiences with the ISO 14,000 approach; and
- 3) canvas views on the appropriate roles for ISO 14,000 instruments or potential roles in regulatory initiatives

It is hoped that this report will provide a useful starting point to interpret the implications in Canada of the development of the ISO 14,000 program and provide starting points to address the views of government in Canada about this issue.

3.0 SURVEY RESULTS AND OBSERVATIONS

3.1 General Observation

All government agencies, industry groups and NGOs surveyed are aware of ISO 14,000. The highest levels of awareness among government agencies are in Ontario, British Columbia and at the federal government level. The lowest levels of awareness are in the maritime provinces.

Training programs, workshops and information session for government employees, regarding ISO 14,000, have taken place in the provinces with the highest levels of awareness and at the federal level. The most action being taken with regards to ISO 14,000 is at the federal government level. The revised <u>Auditor General Act</u> requires each federal department to have an environmental management system in order to meet the sustainable development requirements under that Act. Environment Canada's EMS is modelled after ISO 14,000 and other departments are being encouraged to follow ISO 14,000.¹

The general consensus among governments at this time is that ISO 14,000 will not replace regulations, but will instead, be used in conjunction with them. British Columbia is considering a two tiered system where new industrial sites would have to be ISO certified, as well as meet provincial regulatory requirements (for emissions, etc). It was suggested that this may occur in Ontario as well.

Several government agencies surveyed suggested that it is possible that ISO 14,000 could replace regulations at some point in the future. Also, there is the potential for ISO 14,000 to be referenced in the revised <u>Regulations Act</u> (currently Bill C-25), which provides for the incorporation of standards generally.²

Sections 16 through 19 deal with the incorporation of materials into a regulation by reference, including the referencing of materials that lay down policy. Section 16, subsections (1) and (4) provide that:

It is useful to note, however, that the 1996 Report of the Auditor General on the Implementation of the Federal Environmental Stewardship (see summary at Appendix 1) raises a concern that Environment Canada's decision to treat the implementation of the initiative as a "voluntary one ... may have sent a mixed message to departments and agencies". The report went on to say "In our opinion, this had a significant impact on both the way the Office of Federal Environmental Stewardship discharged its responsibilities as facilitator and on the response of departments and agencies. For example, the production of action plans, progress reports and updates was limited and such documents were not always forwarded to OFES". There is much work needed to make these programs effective and able to deliver measurable environmental improvements.

The different government agencies surveyed seemed unaware of what was occurring in other government sectors with regards to ISO 14,000 (between departments at both the federal and provincial levels of government, between provincial and federal governments, and between the provincial governments themselves). For example, a Deputy Minister of the Environment in a province stated that little was occurring with regards to ISO 14,000, while an official in the pollution prevention department described a system where industry would be required to be ISO certified and meet provincial regulations.

It is interesting to note that the agencies that are most involved with ISO 14,000 (Ont., B.C., feds) were the most reluctant to provide information, were the most concerned about how they had been identified as being involved with ISO 14,000 and had the most internal contradictions between officials.

3.2 Federal Government

There is a high awareness level of ISO 14,000 at the federal government level. Environment Canada, in particular, has been involved with the ISO 14,000 program since its inception.

The Auditor General has recommended that federal departments seriously consider developing an environmental management system and has suggested that ISO 14,000 is a good model. Some departments have adopted various versions of ISO 14,000 in order to meet their sustainable development requirements under the revised <u>Auditor General Act</u>.

Environment Canada is recommending that companies get ISO 14,000 certified as a preventative measure to avoid environmental problems. It is believed that if company is ISO certified they will be aware of their environmental performance and thus able to detect and correct problems before they get out of hand.

ISO 14,000 will not be referenced in regulations or statutes, at this time (possibly because they are too principle based). However, the next batch of ISO standards, being developed over the next couple of years, will be performance based (regarding emissions, etc) and thus will likely be

Section 16 allows the referencing of material that lays down policy. A democratic concern arises over the incorporation of policy elements into Canadian public law, in that the incorporated material may not be formulated through processes involving all the affected parties, including the government itself. There are no plans at the moment to reference ISO 14,000 in Bill C-25 (revised <u>Regulations Act</u>), however, Bill C-25 does provide for the referencing of standards generally and government is very "keen" on this provision in the Bill. Thus, it is *possible* to reference ISO 14,000 in Bill C-25 (see page 2, footnote 2 for a description of the referencing provisions in Bill C-25).

In addition to ISO 14,000 standards, the federal government is examining the use of domestic standards in legislation. Marbek consulting has done work for both Environment Canada and Industry Canada in this regard. A feasibility study for Industry Canada was done regarding a standard for the environmental assessment screening process. The Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency has since had meetings with the Canadian Standards Association and are presently establishing a technical committee to develop the concept further.

3.3 Provincial Governments

Newfoundland

The Ministry of the Environment in Newfoundland is aware of the ISO 14,000 series, however, they do not have as good a handle on it as other provinces, the federal government or industry. While the Newfoundland government is examining the series in light of the present legislative review, there are no government plans at this time to implement ISO 14,000 in any way. It is premature to say at this time how ISO will be used, if at all, and if it will be used in relation to regulations. Only very preliminary work has been done by the government regarding ISO 14,000's impacts, its implications and how it will fit into the regulatory scheme, if at all.

Industry in Newfoundland sees ISO 14,000 as an aid to competitiveness and most industry in NFLD will informally adopt ISO 14,000. It is anticipated that only a few will actually get certified, specifically Hibernia related industry, as ISO 9,000 certification is presently a requirement of the consortium, and thus it is also likely that ISO 14,000 certification will be required at some time in the future.

Quebec

The Quebec Ministry of the Environment has recently organized a committee of government officials to examine ISO 14,000's possibilities. They are consulting with industry and professional groups, but so far there are no recommendations for the Minister regarding the potential use of ISO. Their report is due in September.

The committee's preliminary view is that ISO's role is to stimulate industry, that it is a completely private initiative, and if a company gets ISO 14,000 certified, it will mean nothing to the government in terms of the company's ability to meet provincial regulations.

Ontario

Ontario has a very high awareness level of and interest in ISO 14,000. There has been in-house awareness training for staff with regards to ISO 14,000 and the province is taking a good look at how to take advantage of the series.

The officials surveyed provided somewhat conflicting information. One stated that it is unlikely that the province will require business to become ISO certified and it is premature to say whether ISO 14,000 will be incorporated into provincial regulations. However, another suggested that the province will use ISO in an administrative fashion and create a "super ISO", where a company would have to meet ISO 14,000 criteria and provincially imposed regulations as well.

Both officials agreed that it is unlikely that ISO 14,000 will replace provincial regulations but will likely instead be used in a complimentary fashion. However, one official stated that it is possible for ISO 14,000 to replace regulations in some situations. This same official admitted that ISO alone will not provide the same level of environmental protection that exists now.

Both officials believed that a combination of provincial regulation and ISO 14,000 will result in an improvement of environmental performance by those certified. One official also suggested that ISO certification could save government money (if a company has a good track record after certification with ISO, then the need for government inspection/control will be greatly reduced). This official also acknowledged that ISO 14,000 will not work if a company only gets certified for appearance sake and is not serious about improving their environmental aspects.

Manitoba

Those surveyed in Manitoba are aware of ISO 14,000 but stated that the province is still in the early stages of examining it with regards to policy implications. A workshop including government, industry and ENGOs was recently held to serve as an introduction to ISO 14,000.

Manitoba is considering using ISO 14,000 as a general standard to compliment provincial regulations. The Minister has clearly stated that the focus of the government is on pollution prevention and that ISO will not replace regulations but compliment them.

However, it was suggested that it could be possible in the future, in some areas, for ISO 14,000 standards to replace regulations.

It is believed that ISO 14,000 has the potential to improve environmental performance, however, there is concern in terms of concentrating too narrowly on ISO 14,000, as there are many different ways to achieve good environmental management systems.

Alberta

Discussions regarding ISO 14,000 are at a very preliminary stage in Alberta. Industry has been inquiring about whether ISO 14,000 certification will result in less regulatory control (inspections, etc) but this has not yet been decided.

The main concern with ISO 14,000 is that there are many good EMS systems besides ISO. The main benefit seen by Alberta is the ability of government to have a certain comfort level if a company is ISO 14,000 certified, because it indicates the company is environmentally committed.

There are currently no plans to reference ISO in statutes, regulations or approval systems, but it may be possible in the future.

British Columbia

The two officials surveyed had somewhat contradicting responses. One official stated that not much was occurring in B.C. with regards to ISO 14,000, however, the other described possible plans to use ISO 14,000, including the development of an environmental management system for new industrial sites. This system would require a company to be ISO 14,000 certified before qualifying for authorization from the Minister. In addition, the company would also have to fulfil ministry standards, which would go beyond ISO 14,000 and include legally binding standards for emissions, etc.

3.4 Industry Groups

There is a very high awareness level of ISO 14,000 among industry groups in Canada and around the world. There has been much action on the part of industry with regards to ISO 14,000; many businesses are gearing up for ISO 14,000 certification and many others plan to informally adopt the ISO environmental management system without getting formally certified.

3.5 NGOs

The main concern NGOs have with ISO 14,000 is that the series is being presented as a system for global environmental management and takes the ISO into a new domain of public, rather than engineering, standard setting. The environment is a completely new field for ISO and the procedures that were adequate for technical matters are insufficient to deal with environmental issues.

In addition, ISO 14,000 pushes the argument for business "self regulation" into a new phase and it is feared that the international corporate agenda is to substitute voluntary international standards for mandatory national standards embodied in regulation and thus ISO standards will be used as

a surrogate for compliance with environmental laws. Other concerns include: the ISO 14,000 series was drafted without public debate; will likely be implemented regardless of public opinion or pre-existing international environmental conventions; only measures a firm's conformance with its own management system, not its environmental, health or safety performance; produces volumes of environmental information that is confidential and need not be given to the public, government authorities or workers; and requires compliance with only local regulation, not international or even the firm's home country standards.

4.0 CONCLUSIONS

All sectors surveyed were aware of the ISO 14,000 series of standards. ISO 14,000 is a hot topic, especially in Ontario, British Columbia and at the federal government level. While there are no concrete plans at any government level to incorporate ISO 14,000 standards into statutes, regulations or approval systems at the present time, it is possible that such action may take place at some time in the future. At the federal level, Bill C-25 (Regulations Act) provides for the referencing of standards generally and thus it is possible to reference ISO 14,000 standards in that legislation. It is likely that the federal government will reference future ISO standards that are related to environmental performance, such as standards for emissions, etc.

Most federal departments are implementing environmental management systems in order to fulfil the sustainable development requirements of the <u>Auditor General Act</u>. ISO 14,000 has been described as a good EMS model.

Several provinces are considering creating a system where industry would have to meet both ISO 14,000 standards and provincial regulations. The other sectors surveyed have not ruled out this concept and may very well follow suit.
